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





History and Background

- Library opened in 1883
- Famous H.H. Richardson building
- Renovated in 2007-09 after long dissension, court cases, over building expansion plan
- Moved out and back with help of a ½-mile long book brigade each time
- In new surroundings, community spirit grew


- Library Journal's Best Small Library grant goals became the guidelines for new administration
- *"Where the Community Connects"* became our slogan

Renovation and Expansion

The old furnace room became our new circulation department and is now the hub of the library. Many comment on the book-store/café type environment – and about our friendly, customer service-oriented staff.







These are famous rooms with features designed by H.H. Richardson and Stanford White. Before renovation, the 'Barrel-Vault Room' was crowded with long bookshelves down the center. Now it is a fully wireless reading room with a 60-in. monitor for program presentations and movies



In an environment where some resources are decreasing while demands are increasing, collaboration has become even more essential. Projects, grants, and programs, today, often require extensive collaboration.





Criteria Met: Increase in Library Use, Particularly by New Users

- Children circulation increased in our new building by 150%
- Baby/Toddler/Pre-School Program continues to grow at 23% yearly
- In 2009, we issued 452 new library cards a 110% increase
- Six years ago we had one summer program with 11 kids. This year we ran 4 summer programs with 114 weekly participants.
- Computer use has gone from 25 patrons weekly to summer use at 200 weekly.




