"Zoom fatigue" is real

- 1) Excessive amounts of close-up eye contact is highly intense.
- 2) Seeing yourself during video chats constantly in real-time is fatiguing.
- 3) Video chats dramatically reduce our usual mobility.
- 4) The cognitive load is much higher in video chats.






Access Annotation Tools

Empower participants

- 1) Plan and design a welcoming event.
- 2) Help participants feel ready to participate. Set the expectation early.
- 3) Acknowledge the experiences and ideas that are in the room.
- 4) Provide orientation to the platform and tech in advance. Have some fun!



It's about *PEOPLE!*




From the beginning

- Assign pre-work


Integrate offline with live online



Online in the real world

While it's not always ideal, acknowledging the real world during our workdays gives us some space and grace to be human.

Introduce variety



Plan for a variety of meeting experiences

- Speak to the full group
- Breakout rooms for small groups
- Breakout rooms for 1:1 conversations
- Screen engagement
- Pen to paper reflections

Background visuals – video




- Use participant video to connect, even just for greetings.
- Most effective with a small group – no more than 25. Do you agree?
- Add video and background for virtual meetings to “hide” real life or to add fun to your virtual life.

Background visuals – slides



- Enhance meeting slides with relaxing photos or visuals.
- Slide tools are a blank canvas. Have some fun!
- There are a number of free sites with quality photos!






