

Digitization at small public libraries

OCLC 2017: <u>Advancing the National Digital Platform: The State of Digitization in US Public and State Libraries</u>

- 91% unique, locally significant materials
- 42% had done some digitization
 - 67% of those had no digitization strategy
- 67% identified insufficient staff training/ expertise as a major barrier










Private William D. Wickersham, 39 206 738, Cempany "H", 517th Parachute Infantry, while serving in the Army of the United States, for heroic achievement in action, 7 Nevember 1944. Cappany "H", 517th Parachute Infantry was advancing against an enemy position near Sepel, Prance, with Private Wickersham as lead secut of the leading squad. The forward elements were subjected to machine gun fire from a pillbox immediately to their front. Private Wickersham advanced to within twenty yards of the pillbox, fired his rifle eight times, and then three a scake greende. Under the cover of the scake three a fragmentation greende which killed all four defenders of the pillbox. Private Wickersham's aggressive action and courage under fire were an immination to the men of his unit. Entered the military service from Scattle, Washington.

A New Approach






TALMs + public libraries


- Have access to unique local history/stories to preserve materials/stories that communities are at risk of losing
