- Guard your:

- Reject “too good to be true”
- Research “employers”
- Contact the Better Business Bureau with questions

Keyword Searching

- Advanced Search
- Think like a computer
- Take the good with the bad hits
- Search by:
 - Job Title
 - Skills, Education
 - Interests
- Limit your searches carefully

Five Online Approaches

- Job Search sites
- Employer sites
- Online Classified Ads
- Industry or Association sites
- Social Networking sites

Employer sites

- Some employers only list jobs on their own sites
- Employer sites can provide ideas on other job openings
- Sometimes employer sites allow you to put your name on a hiring list
- Employer sites often provide more information on employer

Online Classifieds

- Popular with smaller, local employers
- Often offer entry level positions
- Watch out for scams
- Many employers require a resume
- Read application procedures carefully

Online Applications

- Address should start with “httpss”
- Read all directions carefully
- Often have multiple pages
- Always include a resume if requested
- Can take up to an hour to complete
