# Libraries Transform!

JKPL began their community discovery process by utilizing the American Library Association advocacy campaign, [Libraries Transform](#). Campaign statements were posted and community members were asked to circle the one most important to them. Library director Shirley Vonderhaar was not surprised by the results.

The statement that was circled the most was "Because 5 out of 5 doctors agree reading aloud to children supports brain development."

Several tied for second: "Because a library card is the most important school supply of all;" "Because learning to read comes before reading to learn;" "Because hands on learning builds stronger brains;" "Because there is no single source for information;" and "Because students who spend time reading over the summer end up on the honor roll in the fall."

# Surveys, Interviews, Dot Boards – Oh my!

Following the *Libraries Transform* community discovery process, JKPL moved on to surveys, interview/brainstorming sessions and dot boards in order to learn more about what the community wanted from the library.

The survey yielded a more surprising result: “I was surprised at how many survey responses indicated an interest in culinary arts (kitchen); now we’ll see what happens with the dot boards from a broader audience.”



# JKPL Staff Get the Ideation Going



The key “rule” of brainstorming or ideation is to defer judgment – there are no “bad” ideas. Just let all ideas flow onto post-it notes, no matter how impractical or wild they seem.

# Interviews, Brainstorming, Ideation

Eight participants, including teens, seniors, crafters and educators, participated in an ideation session, but it was the brainstorming session with the library board that may have been the most surprising for Vonderhaar.

“The session with the Board surprised me – they had so many ideas and were so excited sharing those thoughts. Contents of all the interviews were so divergent, they blew me out of the water. My concern had been that people were too familiar [with the library] to come up with new ideas but that didn’t happen – they had so many ideas.”

# Clearing Space for Active Learning

Half-round and rectangular flipper tables roll on swivel casters and flip down for easy storage.

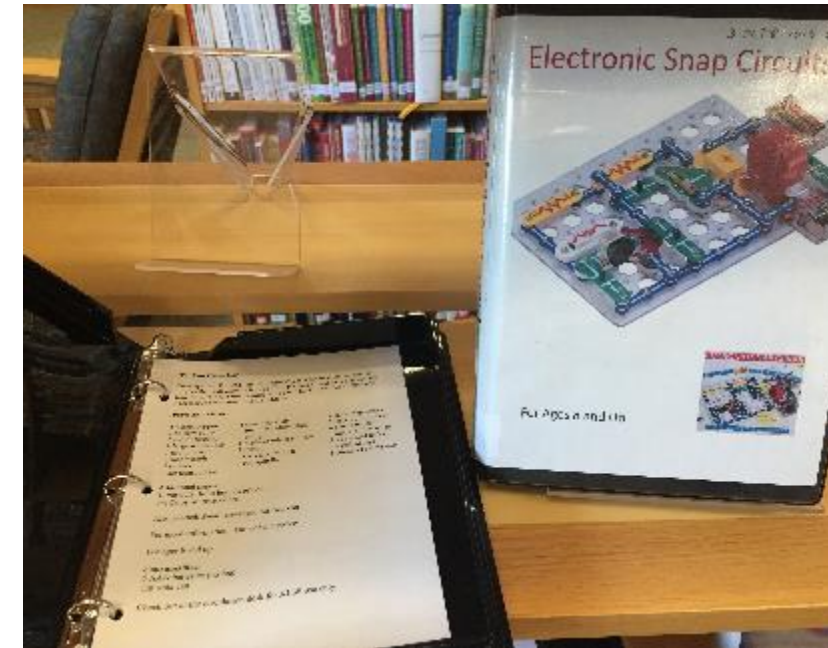
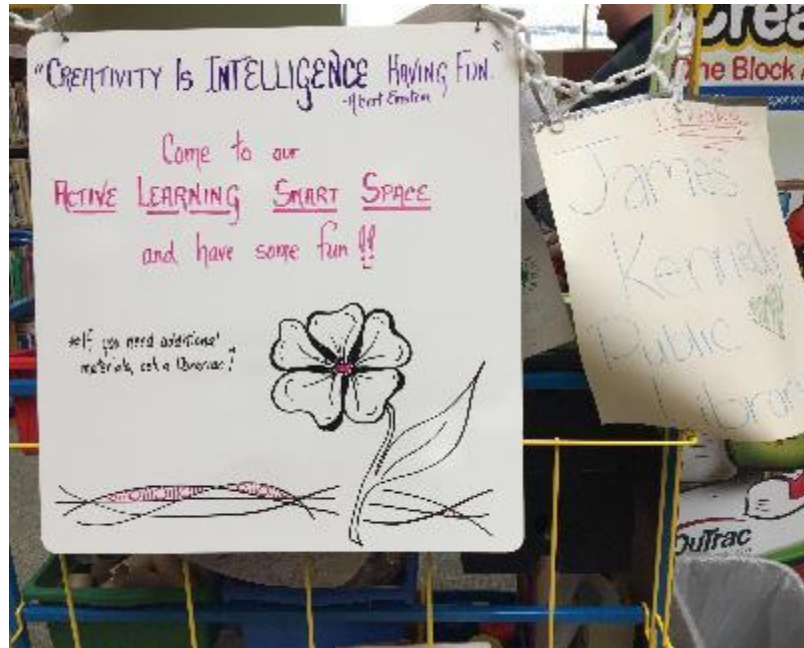

# Active Learning Programming at JKPL

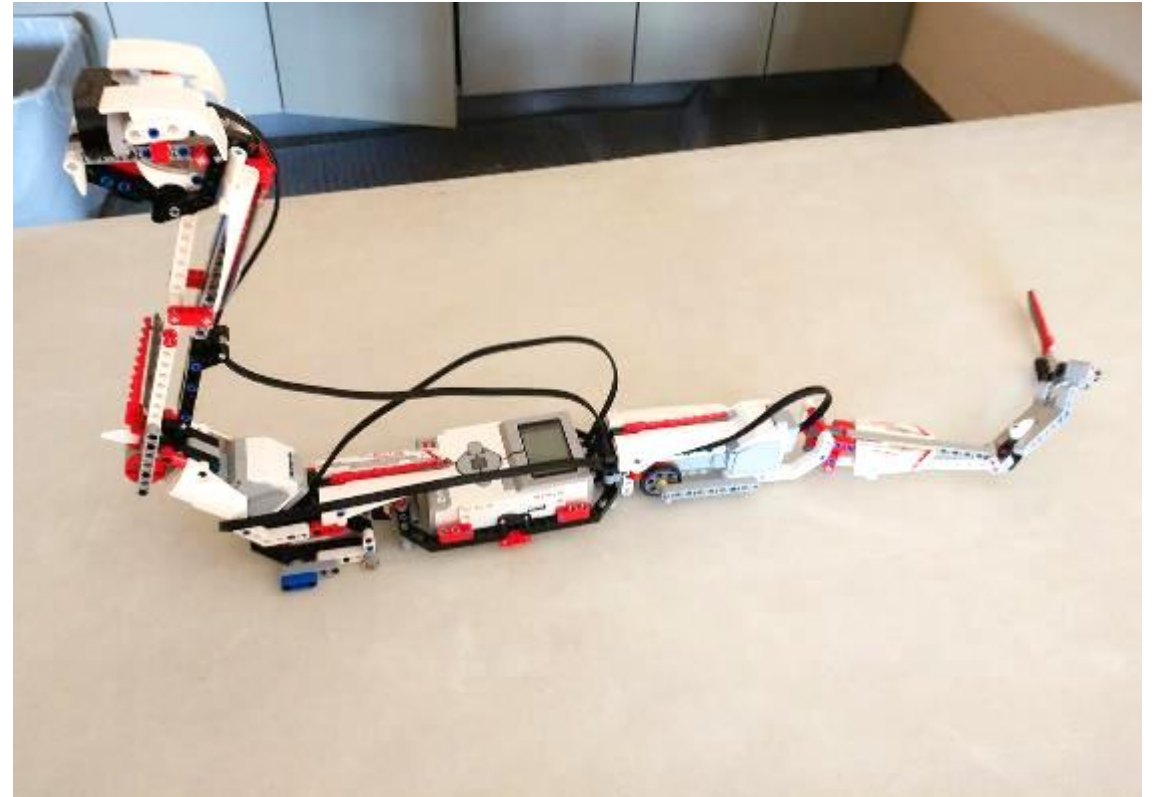


JKPL put a craft cart in the smart space, filled with different supplies such as paper, markers, tape, glue, and other crafting materials for all ages to create with — it has been going over incredibly well. The library is also offering a variety of STEAM, DIY and DIT programming. Examples include Nerf contests, LEGO® building, video and board game programs, robotics and circuits activities, coloring and craft gatherings and workshops, and much more.

## LEGO® Mindstorm Challenge

In the new smart space, JKPL offered a month-long LEGO® Mindstorm program where kids worked together to build programable robots. In the first 3 weeks, the kids came in on Saturday mornings and went to work making the robots. The last week was spent programming and playing with them via Bluetooth tablet programs. The Mindstorms were donated to the library by DuTrac Community Credit Union.

JKPL has also scheduled a LEGO® Day Camp for this fall. This partnership with the Iowa Extension and Outreach will teach kids the basics of coding and programming a EV3 robot.
